# HIGH IMPACT EXPERIENCES Inspire Career Paths

It's 7:30 a.m. and RyanAnne Naughton '13 is putting an ocelot through his paces. At her urging, the cat stands up on his hind legs, showing her his belly as he stretches up against the fence that separates them. While he simply wants to earn a treat, Naughton is checking his well-being.

Her summer internship at Big Cat Rescue in Tampa, FL, was an important step for the biology major, who is well on her way to making her lifelong dream of becoming a keeper for wild cats a reality. In February, she will head to Africa for yet another internship. But this time, no fence will separate her from the much larger cats she will care for.

At the African Lion and Environmental Research Trust (ALERT), Naughton will work with lions that range in age from just a few months to about 18 months old, the age at which they are considered adults. From the tips of their noses to the ends of their tails, male lions

measure about nine feet long and can weigh as much as 500 pounds. Naughton's job will be to interact with these majestic animals, encouraging them to form bonds with humans through – among other methods – physical contact.

For Naughton, these internships are vital to reaching her career goal. "Experience is what employers look for. Every step that I take in learning how to care for these animals is one step closer to being able to land the job I want when I'm done with school," she says.

Physics major Caroline Bartlett '13 took an important leap forward on her way to a career in cosmogony – the study of the origin and development of planets, stars, solar systems, and galaxies - when she traveled in summer 2011 to Canberra, Australia, to study wave velocity differentials as part of her National Science Foundation (NSF) internship.

Several months later, she presented her research in San Francisco, CA, at the fall meeting of the American Geophysical Union, the largest worldwide conference in the geophysical sciences.

"This experience gave me the opportunity to understand what research really is. It isn't reading books and writing a paper; it is actual data

This past summer, Bartlett was in Nantucket, MA, taking part in an NSF internship supported in part by a Massachusetts Space Grant offered by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) and funded by NASA. At the Maria Mitchell Observatory, she monitored a star she believes is in the very early stages of development. The variability in this star, which she watched through a 24-inch telescope, is likely due to planets that are beginning to form around it.

"This internship has given me opportunities that I could not have had anywhere else," Bartlett says. In the coming months, she plans to publish her work in a peerreviewed journal. She will also prepare a poster for the American Astronomical Society Meeting in January 2013.

It's high impact experiences like completing an internship, conducting undergraduate research, and presenting work at conferences and meetings that make all the difference to students' prospects after graduation, says Dr. Deborah Foss, associate dean of advising and the director of MCLA's Center for Student Success and Engagement (CSSE).

"This is not just about being successful in the classroom. It's being successful in terms of your overall development. Students come to college at a certain place and point in their lives, and our role is to nurture them and provide support and engagement to enrich their lives so that they leave us at a higher level of development and achievement," Foss says.

"Certainly, employers want somebody who did well in class," she continues, "but they also want someone who challenged themselves. A liberal arts education is about learning through experience."

Every year, MCLA sends students to the National Undergraduate Research Conference. Other high-impact opportunities at the College include study away, participation in athletics, and service learning. Indeed, high impact experiences are at the core of MCLA's Strategic Plan, as the College ensures the ongoing viability of a broad range of service learning and internship opportunities, and provides welcoming, resource-rich physical and virtual environments that inspire study, teaching, learning, and research.

At any given time, MCLA's sociology department has nearly 100 different internships available to students. Internships are required for two sociology minors - social work and criminal justice because both are applied fields.

"Internships allow students to develop skills," explains Dr. Myles Whitney. The sociology professor emeritus oversees the sociology interns. "They can apply their classroom knowledge to the outside world. They can try or test out a certain career path, and they can build up experiences that can be used on a resume."

MCLA has a high placement rate for alumni who want jobs in the human service field.

"A big asset is the fact that they've done an internship. This gives them a record of performance," Whitney explains. "If you don't serve an internship, you may be a good student. You may be a wonderful intro-level practitioner. But, who's to know? An internship gives you that experience, and it's documented." What's more, Whitney says, "Students oftentimes are offered jobs where they've worked as interns."

Such was the case for Michael Obasohan '11, who worked for three years in MCLA's Office of Student Development. After he graduated, he applied for and was offered a full-time position there. Now he aims for a career in higher education in the area of student affairs.

Rachel Seklecki '11 also built her career on an MCLA internship. She works for Blackbaud at its Charlestown, SC, headquarters, talking to potential customers about the same software she used as an intern in MCLA's Advancement Office. The company – which has locations throughout the United States, as well as in Australia, Canada, Hong Kong, Mexico, the Netherlands, and the United Kingdom –specializes in software for nonprofit and educational organizations.

"You gain so much experience just from working in an office and working in a professional environment. At MCLA, I worked with special events and the Annual Fund. That got me really interested in development, building relationships, fundraising, and nonprofits," Seklecki explains. She took that experience to the Williamstown Theatre Festival, where she was an intern for the director of development. Seklecki discovered that she not only enjoyed working with people, she excelled at it.

Internships, she says, definitely gave her a jump start in obtaining experience and

#### Desgres Named New Career Services Coordinator

Alumni and students have a terrific new resource in Janine Desgres, MCLA's new assistant director of the Center for Student Success and Engagement (CSSE) and coordinator of career services. Desgres specializes in helping students explore majors, careers, and internship and job opportunities. She is also available to assist alumni in internship and job searches.

Desgres says, "We help students when they first arrive on campus to solidify why they're here and find out what they envision for their educational and professional careers. Then, we help them gain experience through internships, job shadowing, part-time, and summer jobs. As they near graduation, we assist them in finding 'the' job."

Students who serve internships tell Desgres that they feel more competent. "It's gaining experience, but it's also using an internship as a way to explore. They learn about themselves. They learn about the world of work and see what's out there," she says.

Involvement on campus, too, is very important from an employer's perspective, because of the skills various activities build.

"It's the soft skills such as working as part of a team, dealing with other people who are different from you, speaking in public, leading and motivating others, and managing resources," she says. "Ideally, a student joins a club or organization related to his or her major, but branching out to other interests is important as well. It's also about building skills. Every single experience you take part in, you're gaining skills and building on skills you already had."

"Study abroad gives students the opportunity to learn about other cultures, which, in this global economy, is so vitally important," Desgres says. "Students are also challenged by a new environment and must adapt accordingly – another skill valued by employers."

Planning co-curricular activities in advance produces a well-rounded education. "By adding in these other, extra, high-impact experiences that really give students experience, they're just becoming that much more marketable as alumni."

However, many young people lack that experience, says Andy Zaback '80, managing member of Longmeadow Capital Partners LLC of Longmeadow, MA. "There are a lot of alumni out there who are willing to give back," he says. "Today, it's a lot of who you know and not what you know, so if you can open doors and help people connect, it's very, very important."

A mentor to a number of MCLA business students, Zaback, too, served an internship when he attended the College. He says that experience had a profound effect on him and helped him go to the next level in his career. "I felt like that was a life-changing, life-influencing event for me, and I want to give back and help young alumni the same way others helped me."

MCLA is fortunate that many of its alumni offer mentoring and internship opportunities to our students, says Dr. Monica Joslin, dean of academic affairs. "Internships not only provide experience in the job market, they give students an opportunity to apply what they learn in the classroom."

According to Dr. Cynthia Brown, vice president of academic affairs, "There is a lot of interest in ensuring college graduates have and use skills such as critical thinking and positive communication strategies to be effective workers and leaders. Internships provide another avenue to learn and practice these so-called '21st-century competencies.""

Among the MCLA faculty who work to provide students with life-changing experiences is Dr. Emily Maher, chair of the physics department. She includes her students in her work with MINERvA (Main Injector Neutrino ExpeRiment v-A) at the Fermi National Accelerator Laboratory (Fermilab) in Illinois, where hundreds of scientists and researchers from colleges and universities across the county and around the globe are studying the neutrino, a fundamental particle.

One of those students is Max Eve '12.


opportunity to see where physics can take me," Eve says.

"It was my first exposure to what it means to be a physicist, and what I have to look forward to."

Maher explains that when students participate in frontier research, they see what it means to actually do physics, which can be quite different from their classroom expectations. Applied projects relate to multiple fields such as engineering and computer science, which provides a multidisciplinary approach, often leading to a deeper appreciation of the underlying physics.

Back at MCLA, Maher and Eve sorted and analyzed the massive amount of data they collected at Fermilab. According to Maher, students learn many different skills as they conduct research, such as problem solving, time management, and organization.

"Students experience complete immersion in an experiment and must learn as they go. This is a daunting task for most, but it is excellent preparation for a future in academics or industry jobs. Students learn to present their results clearly and concisely to different audiences. Sometimes they will present their progress to their research group, while other times they will present to a general audience. Reaching both audiences requires different skills, which helps them in all future paths," Maher explains.



At the American Center for Physics in College Park, MD, Ryan Barley '12 worked at the Center for History of Physics' Neils Bohr Library and Archives, doing historical research and writing for a Web exhibit about Ernest Rutherford, a British chemist and physicist who became known as the father of nuclear physics.

Barley, who wants a career in physics research, says the summer internship prepared him for the research he must do in graduate school.

"This is where connections are made that can help me get my foot in the door for future careers. This is where I can hone the skills that will make me appealing to employers and graduate schools, so in that sense this internship will definitely help me get a full-time job," he says.

Kaitlyn Bonneville '10 says having an internship on one's resume speaks volumes about work ethic, professionalism, maturity, and character, and allows students to see what's out there without having to make a commitment. "It's so hard to get a job without an internship these days. It's expected of our generation that we enter the workforce with some experience under our belts."

An English/communications major, Bonneville completed an internship through The Washington Center in Washington, DC, with a nonprofit organization. Her duties included writing articles for print and for the Web.

The hands-on experiences she had in the small organization provided her with opportunities to build skills in many different areas. Upon her return to MCLA, she became editor in chief of the college newspaper, *The Beacon*, and served a public relations internship in the College's communications office.

Bonneville, who found work in her field soon after she graduated, recently started a new position in Waltham, MA, as the marketing manager for global marketing operations at Lionbridge Technologies, a worldwide firm that offers translation and localization services to global companies.

Internships, Bonneville says, not only expose students to the workforce and potential careers, but they open the door to fantastic networking opportunities that oftentimes can be more rewarding and educational than the internship itself. "Every student who walks through MCLA's gates should take on meaningful internships, network with influential people, and take the right steps toward a successful education and future."

Internships are a powerful tool in building the nation's STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) workforce. Recognizing how important it is for undergraduates to have this important experience right from the start, one alumnus is heading the charge to make that happen.

Brian Fitzgerald '75, Ed.D., chief executive officer of the Business-Higher Education Forum in Washington, DC, recently partnered with U.S. News & World Report to present the U.S. News STEM Solutions Summit in Dallas, TX, where he talked about his organization's STEM Higher Education and Workforce Project.

The project develops campuslevel initiatives to address declining interest and proficiency of U.S. students in STEM fields across the country in private institutions and through public higher education in an effort to meet state and regional workforce needs.

"We see two workforce problems." Students are not aligned with the high-demand jobs, and STEM is a textbook case. STEM jobs will grow 17 percent over the next decade. And computer science is one of the prime areas. Yet, we see the numbers of students studying computer science

dropping over the past decade," Fitzgerald explains.

"As industry transforms itself, every major business organization is a technology organization. They may not manufacture it, they may not sell it, but they use it," he continues. "For example, one third of all Nationwide Insurance workers are technology workers. And yet, they can't find chief level computer scientists. They're importing them from India."

National data show that only 17 percent of this country's 12th grade students who are college-ready in math are interested in STEM careers. "But, when they get to undergraduate education, we lose 50 percent of those students. They transfer out of STEM majors. And, in the highest demand areas like computer science, that attrition rate is up to 70 percent," Fitzgerald explains.

At the summit, Fitzgerald conducted several conference sessions and moderated a keynote luncheon panel about ways in which industry and higher education can collaborate on significant workforce needs, and what types of tools can be used to meet those requirements. Internships, he says, play a crucial role in drawing students to STEM careers.

"Most companies only allow rising juniors and seniors to have internships. We've lost 50 percent of the STEM undergraduates by then," Fitzgerald says. "Internships will get them invested enough to stay and to go into STEM fields.

"If we could halve the dropout problem, we could come close to solving our STEM workforce problem. And the best way to do that is to have the companies that are hiring these students work with colleges and universities to redesign the first two years of undergraduate education to provide incentives early on for students to stay."

According to Fitzgerald, STEM fits squarely within MCLA's mission.

"MCLA can help with the quantitative dimension of the problem, and that really is recruiting more students. With the new science center, MCLA is perfectly primed to address this," he says. "The secret to innovation is workers that have absolutely superior technical skills, married with 21st-century workforce competencies. That means analytical skills, critical thinking, expert communications, and teamwork. Undergraduate education and experiences like internships need to build those skills."

# SECOND TIME'S A CHARM FOR JARROD ABBOTT-WASHBURN '08

#### Jarrod Abbott-Washburn freely admits that his first experience at MCLA didn't end well.

He withdrew from North Adams State College in 1993. Ten years later, he made a triumphant return, graduating in 2008 with a double major in history and philosophy and a minor in political science. He recently earned his master's in ethics and public policy from Suffolk University. Today, Abbott-Washburn is carefully considering his next step, either law school or a political science doctoral program. In the meantime, he's happy to discuss life as a non-traditional student at MCLA and how his experience here helped shape his successful academic career.

#### What led you back to MCLA?

After a ten-year absence from academia, I came to the conclusion that a return to school was necessary to pursue a more satisfying career. At the time, I was cooking at a restaurant as well as working with special needs students at Conte Middle School in North Adams. I was much more fulfilled by and proud of the work I was doing at Conte and realized that a career in the kitchen was not going to be satisfying enough. Although I was not sure what I intended to study, I reentered academia to credential myself for future work and test myself intellectually.

# How did being a non-traditional student impact your experience at MCLA?

The impact was largely social . . . I never participated in the traditional college experiences of campus living. Additionally, perhaps in part because I was so ready to be in school after a long absence, I was an eager participant in the classroom. I was focused on academic success above most everything else in my life.

#### What inspired you to choose your course of study?

I knew I would end up with a major in the humanities and decided on my first

major after taking a history class with Professor Dan Connerton. I loved the source material, and Professor Connerton challenged me to realize my potential. I chose my second major, philosophy, after taking a class with Professor Matt Silliman. He helped me become a more polished student and better thinker. Philosophy appealed to my intellectual curiosity and was foundational in training me how to think critically.

#### How did MCLA encourage innovation in your academic study?

I am not sure how to address "innovation" in my academic study. The most important set of skills I learned were somewhat old school - how to think critically. When I began grad school, I was just as prepared to engage in highlevel academics as my colleagues who attended higher-profile schools, and I attribute this to a number of factors. First, I had professors who were invested in my success. I learned how to think critically and how to dissect arguments. I learned how to access information and properly cite it. I was able to engage in thoughtful discussions with faculty and peers. All of the brochure bullets are true; MCLA students who take advantage of the small school environment can absolutely get a competitive education.

# What advice would you give to undergrads to help maximize their experience at MCLA?

Make the most of professors who resonate with you! One luxury of attending a small, intimate college is access to your professors . . . The course material is only as good as the professor presenting it, and teachers you enjoy can make even the most inaccessible material sing.

#### **SOWING SEEDS FOR SUCCESS**

#### MCLA LAUNCHES FIRST COMPREHENSIVE CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

Anticipation is building at MCLA as a new chapter of growth and expansion, a transformative moment in the College's history, begins. Construction of the new, state-of-the-art Center for Science and Innovation is now well underway. Upon completion of this project in the fall of 2013, a complete renovation of Bowman Hall will begin.

A project of the science center's magnitude is dependent upon an equally ambitious fundraising initiative along with alumni involvement. To this end, the College has launched *Sowing Seeds* for Success: The MCLA Campaign for the Future.

"While past fundraising efforts have helped to lay the groundwork, this is our first-ever comprehensive capital campaign," says Marianne Drake, chief advancement officer and president of the MCLA Foundation. "The changing economic environment of recent years has placed a tremendous emphasis on the need for private funding. We have faith that our supporters, including community leaders, area residents, and

especially alumni, will rise to the occasion."

The Campaign was publicly announced at a kick-off celebration on October 3 that also celebrated President Mary K. Grant's decade of leadership. Drake, working side-by-side with President Grant, the Advancement staff, and campaign committee members, was hard at work long before, developing a donor pool and cultivating leadership gifts. At the time of the kick-off, pledges totaling more than \$17 million had already been made, some of which already has been put to use.

Contributions to the Campaign will create and sustain an unprecedented growth and expansion of College initiatives and help pioneer the Berkshires as a hub of innovation and educational excellence. The campaign's multi-pronged strategy has been developed to provide financial support both now and in the future.

A significant portion of the campaign will support programs and equipment necessary for the operation of the Center for Science and Innovation. The new center will serve as a gathering

place for teaching, learning, research, and innovation, and as a resource for the community. Special features will include an incubator laboratory, customized laboratory space, a vivarium, a rooftop greenhouse, and more. The Center will also allow for collaborative opportunities with industrial partners to enhance teaching and research activities.

The campaign also endeavors to secure funding for academic programs, many of which will be in the renovated Bowman Hall. Following the renovation, Bowman will house the math, computer science, art, and arts management departments. MCLA's arts programs and initiatives are deeply integrated with the vibrant cultural life of the Berkshires. The new Bowman will provide additional space and an inspirational atmosphere in which students can learn and grow, explore their limitless talents and creativity, and embrace the contributions of others.

Yet another goal of the Campaign is to increase the number of permanently endowed funds at the College, thus providing ongoing support for students, faculty career development, and international outreach, as well as increasing the percent of alumni participation of all classes. Every single gift will count, no matter the size.

Drake says that a new matching gift program offered by the state of Massachusetts may allow some donors to maximize their campaign contributions. The State will match, dollar for dollar, all gifts donated toward establishing internships for students, up to \$1 million statewide.

## PREPARING STUDENTS FOR A POSITIVE COLLEGE EXPERIENCE



#### JOANNE R. WHITE '85 SPEAKS AT CONVOCATION

The MCLA campus came alive over Labor Day weekend with the arrival of a fresh new group of undergraduate students.

After moving into residence halls, students met with other new undergrads and transfer students for activities such as the annual hike to the top of Mt. Greylock. (Many alumni remember hiking the peak, the highest natural point in Massachusetts.) Others took part in community service projects in North Adams, their home away from home for the coming years.

First Days culminated with Convocation on Tuesday, September 4, a ceremony symbolizing the official beginning of the academic year and the students' acceptance into MCLA's community of learners. En route to the ceremony at the Church Street Center, students passed through the College's historic wrought-iron gates.

As is customary, MCLA welcomed the return of a graduate to serve as the keynote speaker at Convocation. Joanne R. White '85, an English language arts consultant at the Connecticut State Department of Education, was proud to be that alum.

"I was honored and extremely excited when asked to speak at the convocation ceremony," says White. "Since graduating from MCLA, I have continued to hold the College in high esteem and have been impressed with its leadership and programmatic improvements, which without question, support preparing students to engage in and succeed in a global economy."

White expressed a keen understanding of the concerns and emotions experienced by the incoming freshmen during their important transition to college life. She inspired students by speaking about the importance of education in today's global society, and encouraged them to access academic and social supports to ensure a positive college experience. She spoke about how they have been provided the framework to complete a four-year education, but it is up to each of them to make decisions all along the way. Joanne continued about the journey each new student is embarking upon remarking, "You will create your path and determine your outcome."

When asked how she hoped to influence students, White explained, "My goal is to impart an understanding of the significance of the undergraduate college experience: developing lifelong friendships, taking advantage of internships and study abroad programs, applying newly acquired knowledge, and debating concepts beyond limits allowed in most high school classrooms. Additionally, I want to encourage students to find a sense of balance early on in their academic careers, to ensure adequate attention to studies and a positive social experience. Finally, self-advocacy is important. Students must realize assistance is available for both academics and social concerns and be familiar with how to locate such services."

White earned a master of science degree, K-12 reading specialist, from the University of Houston-Clear Lake and a second master of science degree in education administration from the same institution. She is currently a doctoral student studying education policy and leadership at the University of Massachusetts Amherst.



#### **ROBERT RABIL '87:**

Keynote Speaker for 2012 Commencement

MCLA conferred 380 diplomas on the Class of 2012 at the 113th Commencement on Saturday, May 19. Robert Rabil '87, director of graduate studies and associate professor of Middle East studies at Florida Atlantic University, delivered the 2012 commencement address. He told the Class of 2012 that they are the new generation of leaders and encouraged them to hold to the principles of Thomas Jefferson and the courage of Rosa Parks. "You are standing now on the cusp of profound challenges unfolding in unpredictable ways in our world, from the rise of China as a global power to the fiscal crisis in Europe to the spread of Arab revolutions in the Middle East. Your challenges are diverse and serious and demand more than hard work."

In 1984 Rabil left Beirut, Lebanon, and found his way to what was then North Adams State College. In hindsight, "I think the College played a key role in smoothing my cultural transition from Lebanon to the United States. The welcome, support, and kindness I received from faculty, staff, and colleagues at the College made all the difference in the world in transforming my insecurity, ignorance, and fears into a commitment to better myself as a professional and as a human being," Rabil said.

Rabil received an honorary doctor of humanities degree, presented by President Mary K. Grant. Also receiving honorary degrees were Sandra L. Burton, the Lipp family director of dance and chairwoman of the dance department at Williams College; attorney and philanthropist Samuel H. "Sandy" Laitman of Williamstown; and and Dr. Eugene Leibowitz, MCLA trustee emeritus and former board chair, of Pittsfield.

CAMPUS UPDATE Susan Birns Steps Down as Women's **Center Director** 



After 12 years, Professor Susan Birns has stepped down as director of MCLA's Susan B. Anthony Women's Center. Although the decision was difficult, she says it was simply "time for a change."

The Women's Center has grown and prospered under Birns's leadership. Working with the center's advisory board and student staff, she produced a variety of engaging and educational programs, developed a center newsletter, supported the women's studies minor, and boosted student participation. The center's student staff increased from one or two students per year to three to six, making it necessary for Birns to further reduce her teaching responsibilities to accommodate growth within the center. An annual women's studies dinner, which has enjoyed the support of the Advancement Office and Alumni Association in recent years, was also instituted.

One highlight Birns fondly recalls was working as part of a team to translate Bitches, Bimbos, and Ballbreakers: The Guerrilla Girls' Illustrated Guide to Female Stereotypes into an original theatrical production. "It won the 'Best Program of the Year' award in 2009, played to full houses, and raised over \$1,000 for the Elizabeth Freeman Center for survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault," she says. #### CAMPUS UPDATE **Bike Share Program Spins into Action**



The gears have been turning for some time, but finally the efforts of students and staff paid off last spring with the launch of a bike share program at MCLA. Bikes are now available for loan from Freel Library, offering a fun, healthy, and efficient means to get around campus and town.

Spencer Moser, coordinator of the Center for Service and Citizenship, began brainstorming the possibility of providing bikes as an economical and sustainable mode of transportation for students working on service learning projects. He soon learned of students in an environmental studies class seeking to offer bicycle transportation as a green initiative aimed at campus sustainability. Moser and the students joined forces to research programs on other campuses, develop a plan, and collaborate with administration. Contributions were sought from departments campuswide, resulting in the initial purchase of seven bikes. An eighth, larger bike has since been added.

Student interest in the Bike Share Program has been very high. "I can easily see this program expanding," says Moser. "We will see how things go this fall and re-assess our needs in the spring. Right now, we're still fine-tuning the whole process."

Bikes can be borrowed for a period of 24 hours. They are checked out with the swipe of a card in the same fashion as other library materials.

In the 10 years since President Mary K. Grant took the helm at MCLA, many extraordinary achievements have been celebrated. The first alumna of the college to serve as its president, Dr. Grant came to MCLA with a strong vision for the future, and the passion and leadership skills to realize that vision. Her contributions to MCLA and the community were recognized twice last spring.

In May, Girls Inc. of the Berkshires presented Dr. Grant with the "She Knows Where She's Going" award. Presented annually since 1990, this award recognizes Berkshire County women leaders who exemplify the vision and values of Girls Inc.

A month later, Dr. Grant received an honorary doctorate from Williams College in recognition of her achievements in expanding academic programs and facilities; strengthening connections between the College and community; creating the Berkshire Compact for Education; advocating for public higher education, civic engagement, and community service; and advancing the science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) agenda in Berkshire County and statewide.

MCLA welcomes Howard Jacob (Jake) Eberwein III, Ed.D., as its new dean of graduate and continuing education.

Eberwein says he is both excited and honored to join the MCLA community because the College had a significant role in his professional growth and development. "There is no better time to be afforded the opportunity to strengthen existing programs and to create new programs that will support the advancement of individuals in the public, nonprofit, and private sectors," Eberwein said.

Eberwein spent 18 years as an educator and an administrator in the public schools of Berkshire County, most recently as superintendent of Pittsfield public schools from 2008 until June of this year.

As superintendent, Eberwein's accomplishments include elevating Pittsfield to the top performing school system among the 24 urban school districts in the state. His 2011 bullying policy was recognized as a model plan by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education and the Pittsfield schools were profiled for their efforts on CBS national news. His wellness policy led to the award of a federal grant that will infuse several million dollars into wellness and physical activity programs in Pittsfield's schools.

A recognized expert in urban school leadership, Eberwein served as co-chair of the Massachusetts Urban Superintendents' Network and as a reviewer of the state's successful federal Race to the Top application. He also wrote and implemented Pittsfield's Race to the Top plan.

Eberwein holds an Ed.D. from UMASS-Amherst. He earned his B.A. in biologychemistry from Skidmore College, his M.Ed. from MCLA, and principal certification from MCLA's Berkshire Leadership Academy.

# FORMER ACADEMIC DEAN AND ALUMNA MAKES SPECIAL LEGACY GIFT

North Adams native Dr. Patricia J. Prendergast '51 has witnessed firsthand the evolution of MCLA in the past sixty-plus years. She has seen the College through two name changes, eight presidents, and many exciting achievements. She has a deep appreciation for the meaningful contribution that the College has played in her own life, the lives of countless students, and the Berkshire community. Now, she has chosen to make a meaningful contribution of her own – one that will greatly benefit MCLA in years to come.

Dr. Prendergast began her lifelong relationship with MCLA as a young woman. In 1951, she earned a B.S. in education from what was, at the time, the State Teachers College of North Adams. After several years spent working toward her master's degree from Columbia University and Ph.D. from SUNY Albany, she returned to her hometown in 1955 as a teacher at the Haskins School and, later, the Mark Hopkins School. Her expertise led her back to her alma mater in 1969, when she was offered a professorship at what had by then become North Adams State College. Dr. Prendergast quickly established herself as an integral member of the campus community. She was appointed director of teacher education and, eventually, academic dean.

Following her retirement in 1992, Dr. Prendergast continued to correspond with colleagues and carefully followed the activities of MCLA. She strongly supported the College's decision to adopt its current name in 1997, in recognition of the school's role as the Commonwealth's designated public liberal arts college.

"I applaud the direction that has been taken, because a public liberal arts college is extremely important to the education of students today," she says. "The president, faculty, and staff of MCLA are doing a great job in attracting students and providing them with everything they need."

Dr. Prendergast recently demonstrated her support of MCLA by purchasing a \$100,000 life insurance policy and naming the College as an irrevocable beneficiary of that policy. This arrangement enables Dr. Prendergast to bequest a larger amount to MCLA by leaving a death benefit greater than the premium paid for the policy. It also allows MCLA to recognize Dr. Prendergast's gift during her lifetime, even though the proceeds will not be received until after her passing. In recognition of her gift, the fourth floor outdoor classroom in the Center for Science and Innovation will be named in honor of Dr. Prendergast.

"In terms of public institutions, MCLA is one of the finest," says Dr. Prendergast. "There is no other organization or institution I'd rather support."

Marianne Drake, MCLA's chief advancement officer, extends her gratitude to Dr. Prendergast. "This is the first gift of this nature that we have received," she says. "I sincerely hope that Dr. Prendergast's act of generosity will inspire others. Gifts such as this are a wonderful means to amplify your giving capability. They allow donors to fulfill their philanthropic goals without placing too much of a burden on their current finances."

President Mary K. Grant commented, "This generous gift enhances our ability to invest in the work of our faculty and staff and support our students. The College is honored to have Dr. Prendergast's name associated with us in perpetuity. We cannot thank her enough."
