FROM THE PRESIDENT



Dear Alumni:

When I joined MCLA as president in 2002, the College had established and begun to assert its important role as the Commonwealth's public liberal arts college, but we recognized that we had opportunities available to us to

extend that role and build upon that promise. The institution we are today represents our focused, intentional, and unwavering commitment to our students, this campus, and the community at large. At every step, progress has been made thanks to the hard work, dedication, investment, and support of faculty, staff, students, trustees, Foundation directors, members of the alumni board, friends, and colleagues in the community and at the state level.

We have a great story to tell about the work in progress that is MCLA. It is a story deeply rooted in our history, as evidenced by the example of treasured alumni and good friends like Alma Benedetti '37 (see page 16), and it is ultimately a story of transformation. You can see this powerfully demonstrated in the physical transformation of the campus, and the renovation of teaching, learning, and living spaces. We renovated and reopened Murdock Hall, the oldest academic building on campus, and made the case for the Center for Science and Innovation, our newest academic building. We had a spectacular ribbon cutting celebration for the Center on October 4th, as evidenced by the photos on page 3. Thanks to the generosity of Armand and Donald Feigenbaum, the building will carry their name and provide a transformative stream of resources in perpetuity.

We added a new artificial turf field at the Zavattaro Athletic Complex that provides our student-athletes with one of the finest playing surfaces in all of New England. We completed major renovations to the Berkshire Towers and Hoosac Hall residence areas, creating new living and gathering spaces for students.

Equally powerful was the recent renovation to Amsler Campus Center, providing students with space they have embraced as part of their residential experience.

Smaller, but similarly influential, enhancements have also been made. From the establishment of a new faculty center in Eldridge Hall, to our work positioning Freel Library as a 21st-century learning commons, to projects that make the campus more beautiful, efficient, and sustainable, our remarkable facilities team has worked magic. Our physical spaces speak to their pride in the institution, a pride we all share.

Through *Sowing Seeds for Success*, the College's first comprehensive capital campaign, there are opportunities to be part of this proud tradition and to leave a mark on the physical campus environment.

We continue to transform our academic programs as well. New majors have been added in art and arts management; athletic training; chemistry; environmental studies; and political science and public policy. Please see the article on page 6 about the recent accreditation of the athletic training major.

We launched a new graduate program, the Professional Master of Business Administration. We continue to look at opportunities to develop and deliver programs that are necessary, relevant, and aligned with the needs of our region and the Commonwealth. For example, we've been intentional in growing our Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) programs in particular, knowing that these are areas where there is a great need, and where an education nurtured in a liberal arts tradition can powerfully prepare students for graduate study or careers in the innovation economy.

The quality of our academic programs and the success of our students rely on a remarkably talented faculty and staff. Our faculty are dedicated educators, distinguished scholars, and passionate advocates for their students, and you can read just a few examples of this beginning on page 4. Sadly, we are now mourning the loss of Professor Emeritus Avaz Hajizadeh, a fine man and superior teacher. The scholarship of our faculty has brought MCLA national recognition, and their commitment has guided students to graduate school and into careers and lives as engaged citizens.

The Campaign provides opportunities to support these remarkable professionals.

As a public liberal arts college, our place in the community is vitally important. We have an obligation to provide access to higher education to the citizens of the Commonwealth and to all who seek a high-quality, affordable education. This responsibility and our commitment to meeting it have transformed our place in the community over the past ten years, and have positioned MCLA to be part of the national conversation about the vital role of public higher education and public liberal arts colleges.

Working together, we created the Berkshire Compact for Education and brought together higher education, K-12, public officials, business, and nonprofit leaders in collaboration around a simple, yet powerful vision: that the great educational resources in the Berkshires be deployed to ensure all students in our region complete 16 years or more of education.

Similar partnerships rooted in shared investment in today's opportunities and tomorrow's potential created the Berkshire STEM Pipeline Network and the Berkshire Cultural Resource Center (BCRC). Through these programs, we do good and important work to raise student aspirations, provide professional development opportunities to educators, connect the College to the rich cultural resources in the region, and serve as an economic development engine for the city and the county.

Together, we built the Feigenbaum Center for Science and Innovation. At every step, from the initial vision to the celebration we shared in October, this project relied on the tireless advocacy and engagement of faculty, staff, alumni, trustees, Foundation board members, community members, and friends in the State House who listened when we spoke of this need. The building is a testament to collaboration, vision, and shared investment. I am grateful to everyone who helped make this vision a reality. And, through the Campaign, there are still more opportunities to support, advance, and be part of the legacy of the Feigenbaum Center for Science and Innovation.

Our public role has brought with it national

attention. Through our membership in the Council of Public Liberal Arts Colleges (COPLAC), MCLA is at the forefront of national conversations about the transformative power of the liberal arts. Faculty scholarship has brought us to the attention of funders including the National Endowment for the Humanities. MCLA has been recognized as a Top 10 Public Liberal Arts College by *U.S. News & World Report* for three years running. While we don't do this work for the accolades, the recognition that MCLA is a place where good and important work takes place is gratifying.

Ultimately, the story of MCLA is a story of human transformation. Our buildings, programs, partnerships, and relationships support the work we do for our students. From the moment a student steps onto the MCLA campus – indeed, from the first phone call or email a prospective student or family makes to explore whether MCLA is the right place for them – we are deeply invested in that student's success.

What students gain from their MCLA experience, and from the friendships and relationships that develop through that experience, is transformative. Whether it is a new idea, the confidence that comes from presenting an undergraduate research project in front of an audience, or the realization of a passion for serving others, MCLA is a place that changes lives. I know this to be true, because it certainly changed mine in powerful ways.

I am grateful for the friends, colleagues, supporters, and stakeholders who have been with us over the years. I look forward to the new friends who will join us as we write the next chapters of the MCLA story through the work of the *Sowing Seeds for Success* campaign and the hard work and dedication of the MCLA community.

THE OPENING OF THE FEIGENBAUM CENTER FOR SCIENCE AND INNOVATION

On October 4, 2013, the College cut the ribbon to officially open the Center for Science and Innovation. At the ceremony, the Center's new name was revealed, the Feigenbaum Center for Science and Innovation, in addition to the news that the College received a \$5 million pledge – the largest in the College's history – to *Sowing Seeds for Success: The MCLA Campaign for the Future*. The pledge establishes a new endowed fund that focuses on innovation and leadership in honor of Dr. Armand V. Feigenbaum and his brother, Dr. Donald S. Feigenbaum, who passed away earlier this year. The Feigenbaums founded and led the General System Company, a worldwide leader in the field of Total Quality Management.

LEADING THE WAY

IN INNOVATIVE PROGRAMMING

Since its beginnings as the Normal School in 1894, MCLA has undergone constant evolution and expansion, creating new pathways for students and helping them navigate their individual journeys toward a bright and prosperous future. Recent years have been particularly momentous, as notable additions to the faculty have provided new and innovative academic opportunities and High-Impact Experiences for students.

Dr. Cynthia Brown, vice president of academic affairs, says, “There’s a lot of positive momentum at MCLA right now, a direct reflection of President Mary K. Grant’s vision and leadership. The strength of our academic programs and strong partnership between curricular and co-curricular activities are drawing a lot of interest to MCLA.” Brown says that, through ongoing academic planning, several positions have been added in the fields of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM). The opportunity to teach in a new, state-of-the-art facility like the Feigenbaum Center for Science and Innovation was a powerful incentive in recruitment efforts.

Among the newest additions to the MCLA faculty is **Mark A. Cohen, Ph.D.**, who formerly worked at a Pennsylvania university to join MCLA as an associate professor in the computer sciences department in 2011. Mark feels that MCLA has a great deal to offer both faculty and students, and he especially appreciates the small learning environment. “In a world of distance learning, large lecture classes, and massive online classes,” he comments, “it is very refreshing to have a job where I can actually interact face-to-face with a small group of talented students.”

Cohen has been working in collaboration with colleagues **David Eve, Ed.D.**, and **Mike Dalton, Ph.D.**, to enhance the computer science program, making it “one of the best in the state system.” Four computer science concentrations are now offered:

software development, information technology, business information systems, and bioinformatics. “These concentrations offer students the opportunity to combine computer sciences with other disciplines, giving them the broad skill set needed to tackle the complex problems that companies are facing,” says Cohen.

The bioinformatics concentration was inspired by the 2011 donation of a high-performance computing cluster. **Nuclea Biotechnologies**, headquartered in Pittsfield, Mass., donated the computer to assist faculty in teaching students complex analysis of large data collections, especially biological data that can be used in research pertaining to human disease and drug discovery.

The computer science department joined forces with the biology department to develop new

bioinformatics concentrations within the two disciplines. Associate professor **Ann Billetz, Ph.D.**, chair of the biology department, played an integral role in this effort. Cohen and Billetz also initiated a co-curricular Bioinformatics Club, enabling students to further explore this growing field.

Billetz came to MCLA in 2002, soon after completing a postdoctoral research fellowship at the Cleveland Clinic Foundation’s Lerner Research Institute. She has been instrumental in expanding and strengthening the offerings of the biology program, helping to prepare students for cutting-edge careers within the life sciences. In addition to developing the bioinformatics concentration, she recently collaborated with biology professor **Anne Goodwin, Ph.D.**, to develop the allied health concentration that launched last year.

“The allied health concentration is designed to give students the background they need to go on to a Masters in Physician Assistant Studies or a Masters in Nutrition program,” Billetz explains. “This has become a very popular concentration with our students, due in large part to the high demand for physician assistants in health care today.”



ATHLETIC TRAINING PROGRAM EARNS ACCREDITATION

Current and future students in the athletic training program at MCLA have received some good news. The athletic training major is a nationally accredited program of the Commission on Accreditation of Athletic Training Education (CAATE).

Peter Hoyt, Ph.D., director of the athletic training education program and associate professor of biology, explains that this accreditation will enable students to take the Board of Certification (BOC) exam for athletic trainers upon graduation from MCLA. Those who pass the test are recognized as certified athletic trainers, better positioning them for entry into the workforce or graduate school. In the past, students had to achieve a master's degree prior to taking the test, because the BOC stipulates that candidates for accreditation must graduate from an accredited athletic training program.

"We've been working toward this accreditation for a long time," says Hoyt, who was recruited by MCLA to help put the wheels in motion back in 2005. "The program was originally a sports medicine concentration offered through the biology department. Our first step was to develop it into a full major." This goal was accomplished in 2009, as the athletic training major became approved by the Massachusetts Department of Higher Education. It is the only such program in western Massachusetts, southern Vermont, and eastern New York.

Another important step toward accreditation was the hiring of a medical director, **Paul Donovan, D.O., F.A.C.E.P.**, and a clinical education coordinator,

Ryan Krzyzanowicz, M.S.Ed., A.T.C. "These roles were essential to accreditation, and it is great to have our team in place," says Hoyt.

Athletic trainers collaborate with physicians to prevent, evaluate, and treat injuries to the physically active. They are employed in a broad range of environments, including colleges and universities, gyms and athletic clubs, elementary and secondary schools, industrial and corporate settings, physician's offices and hospitals, and even within the performing arts. MCLA's athletic training program was intentionally designed to connect with cultural and recreational resources in the region that have a health and wellness component. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics projected that the employment of athletic trainers would grow by 30% between 2010 and 2020. Athletic training is recognized as an allied health care profession.

Hoyt credits many people for helping to develop the athletic training major and achieve accreditation. Among them is **John Moresi, Sr., D.D.S.**, a local dentist and longtime friend to MCLA who passed away earlier this year. Moresi, who served as adjunct faculty, was one of the key players in helping to develop the athletic training major. While this accreditation will likely generate more interest in MCLA's athletic training major, Hoyt says the program has always been top-notch. "We've always kept the bar high, because we wanted to ensure that our students had the option to attend and succeed in graduate school."

Research is also important to **Elizabeth Hartung, Ph.D.**, who joined MCLA's Department of Mathematics in 2011, shortly before completing her doctorate in mathematics at Syracuse University. Although she teaches a variety of courses for all levels of math, her area of expertise is graph theory. She is involved in research regarding graph representations of carbon molecules.

Last year, Hartung worked with an undergraduate student on an independent graph theory research study, and she looks forward to working with additional students in the future. "I would welcome the opportunity to collaborate with students from within the math, computer science, or chemistry programs," she says. "It would be interesting to explore the models used within different disciplines."

With the growing emphasis on STEM programs and careers, it became evident that a STEM program manager was needed to support STEM initiatives both on and off campus. In 2011, **Chris Himes, Ph.D.** joined MCLA to

support STEM initiatives both on and off campus


Himes, who came to MCLA after completing postdoctoral fellowships at Williams College and the University of New Mexico, supports students enrolled in STEM programs by overseeing two tutoring programs and by serving on the Student Success and Retention Task Force. "My goal is to help students succeed and prepare them for entering either the workforce or graduate school," he says. He strives to build upon MCLA's reputation for excellent STEM programming by "producing amazing alumni."

Regional outreach is an equally important element of Himes' position. He serves as coordinator of the Berkshire STEM Pipeline Network, part of a state-wide effort to boost participation in STEM programs, increase the number of

STEM educators, and improve STEM educational offerings. Beyond his role as STEM program manager, Himes is an adjunct faculty member, teaching two science courses for non-majors.

Himes became familiar with MCLA during his time at Williams College. "I was drawn to MCLA due to its strong presence within North Adams and the surrounding region," he recalls. "As I got to know more, the student body caught my attention. The whole campus is a vibrant place, and the commitment to student success is inspiring."

While a strong emphasis has been placed on expanding STEM programs in recent years, other academic programs have also continued to grow and prosper. Professor **Joseph Ebiware, Ph.D.**, of the English/communications department, has witnessed this firsthand over the last three decades. He first came to

MCLA from Central Connecticut State University in New Britain, Conn. in 1985. Five years later, he relocated to Baltimore, Md. “Sometimes you think the grass is greener elsewhere,” he reflects, “but when I was in Baltimore, I realized that MCLA was a better fit for me and my family.” He returned to MCLA in 1992, where he has remained ever since.

Through the years, Ebiware and his colleagues have continually worked to enhance the offerings of the English/communications program, providing a solid foundation in literature, writing, language, and mass media, as well as opportunities for specialized study through six different concentrations. Ebiware, who specializes in mass media, teaches a wide variety of courses, including Broadcast Journalism, Script Writing, Broadcast Delivery, Inter-cultural Communications, and News Literacy, among others. He is involved with research on the evolution of mass media technology and its impact on broadcasting, particularly on news.

Ebiware is pleased about the changes that have taken place at MCLA in recent years. “The campus itself has changed dramatically in terms of physical appearance, which is a morale-booster of sorts. It affirms the efficacy of what MCLA does and people’s belief in this institution. Ultimately, it’s an inspiration to be my best every day as I stand in front of students, from whom I also demand a lot.”

With the Feigenbaum Center for Science and Innovation now complete,

the College turns its sights to the renovation of Bowman Hall, to create space to house the math, computer science, art, and arts management programs. When Bowman reopens in 2014, it will feature an art gallery, robotics laboratory, studio space, a faculty center, a high-end computer

graphics design lab, and much more.

In looking toward the future, MCLA will work to ensure that students continue to have access to high-quality, innovative programming led by a team of talented, diverse, and passionate faculty members. ■



MCLA PURSUES REACCREDITATION

In the past two years, faculty, staff, and students from across the MCLA community have been deeply engaged in a comprehensive self-study process as part of the College’s ten year reaccreditation by the Commission on Institutions of Higher Education, a division of the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC).


The self-study prepared by MCLA benchmarks the institution’s progress, challenges, and opportunities relative to eleven standards outlined by NEASC. These standards include: mission and purposes, planning and evaluation, organization and governance, the academic program, faculty, students, library and other information resources, physical and technological resources, financial resources, public disclosure, and integrity.

In addition to serving as a resource for helping institutions such as MCLA maintain their commitment to high standards and quality, accreditation complements the requirements outlined by state educational systems, federal oversight of financial aid, and professional licensure in many fields. NEASC is the regional accrediting body for 232 colleges and universities in New England.

A Tribute to Faculty Emeriti


The word “retirement” means different things to different people. Thankfully, in the world of higher education, it seldom means goodbye. Last spring, as the academic year drew to a close, several highly respected, longtime professors announced their retirement from MCLA.

While they have stepped down from their responsibilities as full-time faculty, they will continue to inspire students and colleagues as they transition to the role of emeritus professors, a new chapter in their academic careers.

Donald Washburn, Ph.D., professor of English/communications, left his home in Pennsylvania, bound for MCLA, in 1971. Washburn played a key role in broadening the offerings of the English department. He is credited with developing the highly successful communications program and with creating a variety of unique courses, some of which have stemmed from his own strong sense of spiritual awareness. Among them is Science and Spirit, which he has returned to teach this semester.

“This course challenges students to examine the question of what kind of life they want to lead,” Washburn explains. “There is a lot of wonderful

literature that explores the dialogue between spiritualism and atheism. People think there’s no place for religion in higher education, but my classes present all different views and allow students to make their own choices.”

At age 81, Washburn says he still feels as sharp as ever, which he attributes in large part to living a healthy, active lifestyle. In his newfound free time, he is enjoying the opportunity to focus on his poetry and pursue other interests, such as composing music.

Another Pennsylvania native, **Robert Bence, D.A.**, professor of political science and public policy, taught at schools throughout the country before finding his way to MCLA in 1976.

In the 37 years since, Bence has appreciated the opportunity to develop and teach a wide variety of courses focused on government, politics, and policy at the local, state, national, and international levels. Specific courses

have included US Government and Public Policy; Middle East and the United States; Arab World in Transition; Political Behavior and Elections; and Canadian Politics in a Comparative Perspective, among others. Some of his courses have enabled him to lead educational trips to Canada and other locations with his students.

While Bence is taking the fall semester off to travel to India, he is scheduled to teach two courses during the spring 2014 semester. He looks forward to spending more time with his wife, children, and grandchildren; enjoying his many outdoor hobbies; and becoming more politically active in his retirement.

Anthony Gengarely, Ph.D., joined MCLA as a history and political science professor in 1972. In 1994, after completing a master’s degree in art history from Williams College, Gengarely transitioned into MCLA’s

newly founded fine and performing arts department. From 1997 to 2003, he served as managing editor of and frequent contributor to *The Mind's Eye*, a journal of scholarly and creative work published annually by MCLA.

He served as chair of the fine and performing arts department from 2004 through 2012, during which time he oversaw the creation of two new majors: one in arts management, the other in art.

Gengarely also developed a ten-year working relationship with autistic artist Jessica Park, who lives in Williamstown, Mass. Gengarely and his students created four exhibits featuring Park's work and published a seminal book in 2008, *Exploring Nirvana: The Art of Jessica Park*. A second book about Park, *A World Transformed*, was the recipient of the faculty lecture award in 2012.

Gengarely plans to continue his involvement with the Jessica Park Project and teach on a part-time basis. He is also grateful for the opportunity to spend more time with his wife and enjoy his two grandchildren. ■

On Saturday, May 18, MCLA welcomed the members of the Class of 2013 into the alumni community at the 114th Commencement ceremony.

Diane Patrick, First Lady of Massachusetts, was presented with an honorary doctor of laws degree and delivered the 2013 Commencement address.

Mrs. Patrick is a lawyer, domestic violence and mental health advocate, educator, and community volunteer. She holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in early childhood education from Queens College of the City University of New York. After teaching elementary school in New York City for five years, she entered Loyola Law School in Los Angeles, Calif., to study labor and employment law.

After moving to Massachusetts with her husband, Governor Deval Patrick, she accepted a position at Harvard as University Attorney in the Office of General Counsel, where she spent six years before becoming Harvard's director/associate vice president for human resources.

In 1994, Mrs. Patrick took a job with the Washington D.C. firm Hogan and Hartson, where she worked with both the education and labor and employment law practice groups. She joined the law firm of Ropes and Gray in Boston in 1995 where she combined her passion for education and her background in labor and employment law.

In her address to the class of 2013, Mrs. Patrick said, "Education can be a powerfully transformative experience if you let it be... I think this place encourages us to open our eyes and minds, to see and hear and think about things in different ways." She challenged the graduates to take risks – discover who they are and what's possible.

Also receiving honorary degrees this year were **Elizabeth Coleman**, president of Bennington College; **Mardi Ann Crane-Godreau '98**, medical researcher and assistant professor at the Geisel School of Medicine at Dartmouth; and **John "Jack" Downing**, president of Soldier On.


BEYOND THE CLASSROOM

Increased Diversity Leads to New Campus Clubs and Activities

Continued growth, expansion, and strengthening of academic programs at MCLA, combined with new outreach strategies, have resulted not only in increased undergraduate enrollment, but also in an increasingly diverse student body. Students representing a widening array of cultures, interests, and geographic areas are discovering the opportunities available at MCLA, not to mention the rich, cultural heritage of the Berkshires. In correlation with this growth, campus clubs and organizations are flourishing, creating a more vibrant and thriving community than ever before.

"It's a natural progression," explains **Celia Norcross**, director of student development. "Our student body has become more diverse, and new clubs have been driven by student interest. The more clubs there are to choose from, the more likely that students of varying interests will find one or more that appeals to them."

The benefits of becoming involved in co-curricular clubs and activities are vast. Students acquire valuable

new skills, learn to manage their time wisely, and develop a greater awareness of available resources. With today's reliance on technology to communicate, Norcross says that participation also promotes face-to-face contact with others and contributes to community-building.

"Students learn to work together toward a common goal – to live and breathe together," she explains. "It's very important for them to gain these parameters before they enter the workforce."

HARLEQUIN, a musical theater club, comprises MCLA's fine and performing

arts students and offers a perfect example of student collaboration. Norcross, the club's staff advisor, says that every Harlequin production is entirely student run, from auditions through the final performance. "They do the casting, build the sets, conduct rehearsals, and even staff the box office," she says. "It's very empowering for them to see what they can accomplish by working together."

Juwonni Cottle '13 learned this in 2009 when he approached the Hoosac Hall Advisory Board for permission to lead a ten-person holiday caroling group as part of a community service effort.

"The ten of us had a great time rehearsing and making music, so we decided to take the group to the next level and become an official organization," he recounts. "I wanted everyone to respect us, not only for our personality and showmanship, but for our technique as well."

THE ALLEGRETTOS, an award-winning a cappella and gospel ensemble, was born. Known for its powerhouse vocals, the group has since

tripled in size, performed throughout Massachusetts, and has been featured on the WGBY series *Together in Song*.

The level of commitment exhibited by The Allegrettos and other student groups across campus is commendable and has become a source of pride at MCLA.

Monique Symes '11 is also credited with co-founding an award-winning performing arts club at MCLA. Symes, who had long enjoyed African-American step dancing, says, "it was only natural for me to want to continue doing something I loved." She joined forces with fellow stepper **Jamila Creswell '11** to form the

NEXXUS STEP SQUAD. The group combines elements of marching, South African Welly dance, and other forms of dance to perform approximately five shows a semester.

Symes says that NEXXUS had a major impact in enriching her college experience. "Coming out of high school, I was extremely focused on academics," she says. "That's important, but I needed something else I could be passionate about. NEXXUS enabled me to become a part of the MCLA community... my team members became like family, and I was also able to build relationships with faculty and staff." According to Norcross, groups such as NEXXUS, that are multicultural in nature, have become much more prevalent. "These students have cultural traditions that are near and dear to their hearts, and they want to be able to share that with the student body and the surrounding community," she says.

Thomas Alexander, coordinator of ALANA, International, and Veteran Student programs and services, couldn't agree more. The number

of multicultural students has risen dramatically, which he says is "truly a college community effort." **ALANA**, a component of the Multicultural Education Resource Center, was developed to support this growth and assist multicultural students in becoming more connected to campus life. Its mission, Alexander says, is to "embrace the contributions of various cultures" and to "empower or re-empower students, through education and collaboration."

While multicultural clubs represent a significant portion of new co-curricular and extra-curricular offerings, special interest clubs also are on the rise. Students passionate about everything from world-record breaking to fashion to taking action for gender equality now have an avenue for sharing and exploring their interests with others. For some, this is also an opportunity to educate and inspire change. Such is the case with the **ENVIRONUTS**, a group co-founded by **Jason Brown '13**.

The Environuts got its start in 2010 during a Green Living Seminar presented by the environmental studies department and the **MCLA**

Berkshire Environmental Resource Center (BERC). During the seminar, Brown collaborated with three other students in developing a club to promote green living and sustainability. The group later wrote a constitution and sought recognition as an official MCLA club.

Today, Brown says, the Environuts play a vital role in serving as the "student leg of sustainability." Its members work closely with the College's Sustainability Committee (aka "Green Team") on efforts to become a climate neutral campus. This is in accordance with the American College and University Presidents' Climate Commitment signed by MCLA President Mary K. Grant in 2007.

"It is very satisfying to be able to find something you are passionate about and turn it into a thriving club," says Brown, who also served as president of MCLA's **STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION (SGA)** during his senior year. In this role, he had the opportunity to help other clubs on campus reach their full potential.

"MCLA prides itself on being a very vibrant community, and the contributions of students outside the classroom have a lot to do with that," he comments. "SGA is responsible for overseeing all of the clubs and activities on campus and allocating student activities fees among them. It's a great opportunity to have a significant impact on student life."

While many of the clubs at MCLA are relatively new, the SGA has been in operation for more than a hundred years. The group, consisting of an elected cabinet, several appointed positions, a student senate, and class representatives, was formed to facilitate, supervise, and unify matters of campus student governance. Staff member **Diane Collins** has served as the SGA office manager for the last three decades.

"When I took on this position, there were only 18 clubs," she reflects. "Now there are nearly 60. With so many new multicultural and special interest clubs, there truly is something for just about everyone who wants to become involved."

Alyson Stolz '15, who was elected to serve as Student Trustee for the SGA during the 2013-14 academic year, says the SGA plays a strong role in unifying the campus.

“Being part of the SGA helps you personally and also helps your classmates – all those you represent,” says Stolz. “It’s been a great experience and has helped me grow as a person and as a leader. I can’t wait to see what comes of it.”

For students like Stolz, who give so generously of their time and talents while at MCLA, “what comes of it” will likely be a very bright and rewarding future. These are not students who wait idly for opportunity to find them. They are capable, confident, passionate leaders who take charge of their own destiny and care about the world around them. Wherever life takes them, they will undoubtedly help to make their communities a better place, just as they have at MCLA. ■

EMPOWERING STUDENT ATHLETES ON AND OFF THE FIELD

As exciting as it may seem from the sidelines, the life of a student athlete is uniquely challenging. Balancing athletics, academics, and their social lives can be overwhelming at times, as can trying to live up to others’ expectations. Without proper support, student athletes can easily succumb to feelings of stress, anxiety, and inadequacy.

In compliance with the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), MCLA strives to protect the welfare of student athletes and enhance their college experience through the Student Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC). Developed in 1989, the committee consists of approximately 25 student athletes representing each of MCLA’s teams. **Dot Houston**, assistant athletic director/senior women’s administrator, co-advises SAAC with **Kaylyn Smith**, an NCAA grant-funded intern serving as assistant to the director of athletics.

“Our goal is to give student athletes a voice in matters both on and off the field and to help connect them to the campus and community. We meet regularly to talk about issues pertaining to lifestyle, academics, and athletics and to keep members apprised of any policy or bylaw changes set forth by the NCAA,” explains Houston.

SAAC is also a means to unify student athletes, foster the student-athlete image, and promote the principles of good sportsmanship. Working through SAAC, student athletes help organize and coordinate campus events such as Fan Day, National Girls and Women in Sports Day, and Division III Week, and contribute approximately 1,000 hours per year in community service.

Based on the achievements of student athletes, it appears as though SAAC has a positive impact. A number of MCLA’s student athletes are named to the MASCAC’s All-Academic Team each semester, signifying a cumulative or semester-based grade point average of at least 3.20. In addition, **Jami Morrison** was named MASCAC Coach of the Year. Last January, as testimony to MCLA’s commitment to good sportsmanship, the Women’s Soccer program received the National Soccer Coaches Association of America Silver Award for Ethics. This marked the fourth straight season in which the Trailblazers’ program received an ethics award for exhibiting fair play, sporting behavior, and adherence to the rules of the game. MCLA has been the recipient of such awards in ten of the last eleven seasons.

Houston says that, in addition to being represented at MCLA, SAAC gives students an opportunity to provide feedback that can be shared on both the conference and national levels and help shape future NCAA legislation. A member of the Massachusetts State Collegiate Athletic Conference, MCLA is affiliated with the NCAA’s Division III.

ALUMNI SUPPORT AND PARTICIPATION

ON THE RISE

It has long been recognized that active, supportive alumni are an excellent indicator of a college’s success. The loyalty and affinity of former students signifies that they enjoyed their experience at the institution; felt engaged in the campus community; and have been able to succeed in life, thanks, in part, to the education they received. Discover Your Hidden Philanthropist

Supporting a cause you feel passionate about is a wonderful way to demonstrate your values. Unfortunately, many individuals don’t believe they have the financial means to make a significant contribution. According to **Kathleen Therrien '97**, specialist in planned giving, people are often surprised to discover their hidden philanthropic potential.

“We all accumulate assets during our lives that we take for face value and don’t really think about how they could enhance our current income and also benefit others,” says Therrien, who serves on the MCLA Foundation Board of Directors and is the director of trust and estate administration at Williams College. Since MCLA is in the midst of a Capital Campaign, it’s a perfect time to consider broader giving opportunities and also remind people that the College receives only one-third of its support from the Commonwealth.

Below, Therrien responds to questions about planned giving and the assets that may enable you to consider a charitable gift to MCLA, supporting its needs and yours:

What are the advantages to giving stock?

Giving appreciated stock (held for more than 12 months), rather than cash, enhances your giving power. If you give \$1,000 in cash, the gift costs you \$1,000, and you receive a charitable deduction for the same amount. If, instead, you choose to give \$1,000 in stock, your gift is \$1,000, but your cost for that gift is what you paid for the stock. In addition, you avoid capital gains tax on its gain in value AND receive the same charitable deduction as the cash gift.

Can I make a gift directly from my IRA?

Yes, The American Taxpayer Relief Act of 2012, which extends through December 2013, allows donors age 70 ½ or older (the age at which minimum distributions are required, aka RMD) to make immediate gifts of up to \$100,000 of their RMD directly from their IRA to qualified nonprofits without paying taxes on that income. It’s a great solution for those seeking to reduce their taxable income and support numerous qualified public charities.

I have a life insurance policy I no longer need. Can that be given to charity?

Certainly, naming MCLA as the owner and beneficiary of a whole life insurance policy is a great way to support the College. Your gift would be equal to its cash surrender value or premiums paid, whichever is less, and provide immediate funds to the College for your directed use. This type of gift would also provide you with a charitable deduction, again reducing your income.

Can I receive income back from my charitable gift?

Yes, for capital gifts, but not for annual alumni fund support. MCLA recently started offering a life income fund known as a Charitable Gift Annuity (CGA) for donors age 60 and older, living in Massachusetts, who give \$10,000 or more in cash, stock, or insurance. A CGA provides up to two income beneficiaries with fixed income payments for life based on the value of the gift and its expected term. Those payments can start immediately or be deferred for up to twenty years. Donors receive an immediate partial charitable deduction and potentially tax-free and

reduced capital gain income over the life of the fund, depending on the type of asset establishing the fund. Upon termination, the proceeds will support a chosen use at MCLA.

A charitable remainder trust, established through a third-party financial institution, is another way to provide for MCLA while also receiving income for life or a set period of time. If you already have a charitable remainder trust and have not designated a charity to benefit from its remaining interest, you can assign all or a portion of its remainder to MCLA and receive gift recognition in the College’s current campaign.

Can I include MCLA in my will?

Making a bequest within your will or living trust is a wonderful way to support MCLA. While this does not provide a current gift or current benefit to you, it ensures that the institution will receive either a specified dollar amount or percentage of your estate upon your passing. If you decide to make a charitable bequest but your will has already been executed, you can easily make this provision through a codicil. Another option is to name MCLA as the beneficiary of your retirement account, commercial annuity, life insurance policy, or donor advised fund.

With so many options, Therrien says that anyone with the desire to give can find a way to make it work. Of course, before making any gift to charity, you should seek counsel from your financial advisor.





IN MEMORIAM



Avaz Hajizadeh, Ph.D. retired from MCLA in May 2013 after 30 years of distinguished service to the Commonwealth, the College, his colleagues, and the MCLA community. Sadly, Avaz passed away unexpectedly on September 2 of this year.

Hajizadeh graduated from Pahlavi University, Shiraz, Iran with a degree in economics and public administration. He later earned an MBA from James Madison University, and both an M.S. in operation research and statistics, and a Ph.D. in managerial economics from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. In 1982, Avaz began his career in the business administration and economics department at MCLA. He was awarded tenure in 1988 and was promoted to professor of business administration and economics in 2003.

Hajizadeh was an active and highly respected member of the MCLA campus community. President Mary K. Grant noted that “Avaz cared deeply about his students, and had a profound impact on them both in and out of the classroom. He was a fan of MCLA’s student-athletes, and a fixture in the stands at Trailblazer games.” She went on to say that “He was a trusted advisor, mentor, and friend to his colleagues, celebrated for his insight and wise counsel.”

During his time at the College, Hajizadeh served on a number of committees, including the 2002 presidential search committee that brought President Grant back to her alma mater. In recent years, Hajizadeh served as member of the MCLA strategic planning task force, and as Faculty Marshal. He was part of an ad hoc

working group charged with drafting a new mission statement for the College that was approved by the Board of Trustees in March 2013.

He was a passionate advocate for the College. Deeply respected and beloved by former students, he was instrumental in re-engaging alumni and always went the extra mile to stay connected via phone calls, letters, email, and attendance at alumni events, including events in the Berkshires and Boston. In addition, Hajizadeh recently had answered the call to serve the College as a member of the MCLA Foundation Board of Directors, working to secure and steward a bright future for the College, just as he guided so many students into their own successful futures.
