

Sustainability: Deep-Seated Tradition at MCLA

Anyone who visits Stephanie Burton '08 and Dan Harris '08 at their house in Goshen, Massachusetts, invariably notices something remarkable: virtually all of their yard—the space that in most homes would be given over to green lawn—is dedicated to growing food. Vegetables grow in containers and hens scratch at the earth, while nearby, worms break down kitchen scraps into organic compost. And, this small lot is just the beginning; drive a few miles down the road, and you'll see a robust community garden that the couple recently founded on a friend's land.

The Center for Resourceful Living (CRL) was a program at the College in the 1970s and the mid-80s. Its intention was to offer students the freedom and facilities to explore how to live in harmony with nature and to help students acquire skills, knowledge and values enabling them to become more self-reliant and self-sufficient by utilizing limited resources to their fullest potential.

During the week, both Burton and Harris work for Berkshire Environmental Consulting, which helps industrial firms comply with environmental regulations. In their spare time, they bake bread from scratch, brew their own beer and organize “work parties” for planting, weeding and harvesting.

“We eat as locally as we can, and this means growing our own,” says Burton. “This is part of our effort to live in a sustainable manner.”

Harris agrees. “We’re at a critical time in history,” he says. “Our nation faces so many environmental and economic challenges. I really believe that doing more for ourselves, relying less on industrialized systems, is an important part of facing those challenges.”

By any standard, Burton and Harris are impressive ambassadors of sustainability. However, among graduates of the College, they are just two of many. Today, alumni are promoting sustainability in a staggering array of industries, including trucking, apparel, industrial manufacturing, resource conservation, renewable energy and education.

Sustainability is front-page news—from melting ice caps to dependence on foreign oil, and from the often-discussed “green economy” to ensuring adequate food and water for a growing population. Many of our biggest challenges as a society are rooted in a simple question: how do we make the best use of our existing resources?

It’s a question that has as many answers as there are individuals to answer it. For their part, alumni have responded by teaching environmentalism, working for national parks, designing sustainable products, producing clean energy, helping green global production facilities, conserving natural ecosystems and showcasing the beauty of our planet through the arts.

“In myriad and tangible ways our graduates are joining worldwide efforts to care for our planet. By doing so, they are changing our country and our world for the better,” says President Mary K. Grant.

From Counterculture to Campus Culture

Burton and Harris were environmental studies majors—indeed, they were non-traditional students whose interest in MCLA was piqued specifically because the College offers an environmental studies program. But the roots of the College’s ecological movement began long before the current environmental studies program was founded. The College’s first foray into sustainability was in the 1970s, when Professor of Education Larry Vadnais and his wife Betty founded the Center for Resourceful Living (CRL).

“It was right after the first gasoline crisis,” says Professor Vadnais. “I started wondering how prepared students would be to face a time of scarcity. This prompted me to look into other things, like how much energy it took to grow the food we bought at the supermarket. I was just amazed.” With support from the trustees and administration, and with help from a grant, Vadnais

and his students created a working farm, first on campus, and then in Stamford, Vermont, on the Vadnais' own property.

Center for Resourceful Living students grew their own food, raised livestock, generated solar energy, visited farm auctions, made their own cheese and butter, learned food preservation techniques, used traditional tools, made goods by hand and explored the business and philosophical challenges of living in a sustainable manner. It was, Vadnais noted, an entirely different approach to education.

"In most classes, you learn material, and then later you are tested on that material. The Center for Resourceful Living was quite the opposite. We'd be faced with a test—a bunch of sick piglets, or a crop of tomatoes that was withering—and then we'd have to learn, right then and there, what was happening and how to respond. We could see the immediate meaning and necessity of what we were learning. This was wholly different from traditional education, and students just threw themselves into it. I think it helped build character, responsibility and accountability."

The program had a core of profoundly enthusiastic students, yet the Center remained small until it closed in the 1980s.

"We were never a mainstream part of campus," said Vadnais. "When I look at the photos now, I can see how others saw us. We were countercultural all the way. But that's how it was at the time; if you were an environmentalist, if you talked about scarcity

in an era of cheap gasoline, people thought you were crazy. It just wasn't how most people thought."

Twenty years later, the situation has changed. Today, sustainability is being integrated into all aspects of campus life. In 2007, President Grant signed the American College and University Presidents' Climate Commitment, an agreement to make campuses across the country carbon neutral. Shortly thereafter, a campus-wide committee—a 30-member team comprised of faculty, students, administrators and other staff, dubbed the "Green Team"—began identifying specific ways the College can reduce waste, save energy, support more eco-friendly vendors and engage in special projects to promote sustainability.

To date, the College has increased recycling efforts, installed solar panels on campus buildings, reduced waste and packaging in dining services, brought environmental leaders—including Pulitzer Prize finalist Scott Weidensaul and Nobel Prize-winner Bill Moomaw—to campus, launched a Green Living series on food production and even started an MCLA campus garden near Smith House (pictured on cover). In addition, an anonymous donor recently finished endowing the Vadnais Lecture Series, supporting an annual lecture in environmental issues in perpetuity.

The forefather of the College's environmental program, Larry Vadnais, is impressed. "It's amazing," says Vadnais, of the extent to which sustainability has become such an important part of campus life. "It's just so wonderful to see."

Perhaps most importantly, the College created the environmental studies major, run by a dedicated faculty member, Elena Traister.

The theoretical lessons learned in the classroom are applied to a variety of terrestrial and aquatic ecosystems in order to enhance the study of human activities and their effects on natural systems.

From the Classroom to the Real World

“Our goal is to provide students with the background they need to tackle real-world problems,” says Traister. “Everywhere in the world, leaders are looking at issues of greenhouse gases, biodiversity, environmental justice and the green economy. The environmental studies program, along with the explosion of campus activities related to sustainability, helps prepare students to face these issues head-on.”

Traister notes that while the major is new and graduates are still young, students who pursued environmental studies at the College are already working in green fields. Several MCLA graduates are working to monitor environmental health; one runs a farmers’ market in Vermont, while another has launched a line of eco-friendly ski and snowboarding apparel. Others are employed with the USDA Agricultural Research Service in Hawaii, Maine Land Use Regulation Commission, and Berkshire Photovoltaics, a solar energy firm founded by Chris Derby Kilfoyle ’76, who was involved with the Center for Resourceful Living in its early years.

“These jobs are responding to a real environmental imperative and to profound economic and societal shifts,” adds Traister. “The jobs are appreciated worldwide.”

Students who never specifically studied environmental issues have found that their education at the College prepared them to face environmental challenges. Doreen Yale Zaback ’79 was a medical technology major who took numerous classes in the sciences. After working in the medical technology field, she

went to graduate school to study geoscience, eventually earning a Ph.D. Today, she works with Connecticut municipalities converting solid waste to renewable energy, which is then sold on to the electric grid. Prior to this job, she worked in environmental site assessment and helped major manufacturing facilities adopt more environmentally-friendly practices.

“Having a science background allowed me to venture off into many different directions,” says Zaback. “I’m grateful that the College helped me gain such a sure footing in the sciences.”

Her environmental focus doesn’t end with her workday, however. Zaback also serves on the board of the ReCONNstruction Center, an organization that recycles building materials with the goal of keeping items out of landfills and conserving natural resources. She also gardens, composts, limits her driving when possible and takes other steps toward personal sustainability.

“Living in a sustainable manner, incorporating it into every aspect of your life just makes sense,” she says. “There’s no reason to waste natural resources, to waste energy or to waste money. Living green is simply common sense.”

Traditional Industries Going Green

Graduates are making a difference even in industries that are not usually considered pro-environment. Alum Frank O’Brien-Bernini is another Center for Resourceful Living student. Today, he works for Owens Corning, a Fortune 500 company that makes building materials. While this might seem a long way from his days on the Vadnais farm, he is in fact vice president and

chief sustainability officer in charge of “greening” the company’s worldwide facilities. O’Brien-Bernini will be this fall’s Vadnais lecturer and will speak on campus on October 22.

Another graduate who is helping green a traditional industry is Cynthia Borek Normandin '76. Normandin helped implement efforts to promote sustainability at Braun’s Express, the trucking company she co-owns with her husband David.

Braun’s Express has installed technologies that reduce fuel consumption and lower emissions. The company equipped long-haul trucks with rechargeable battery packs, so drivers don’t need to idle vehicles for heat or other power needs while resting; installed automatic engine shut-offs on shorter-distance trucks to reduce idling; put energy-efficient wide-base tires on their vehicles; started computerized monitoring of tire pressure and trained drivers how to improve fuel economy. Onboard computers allow the company to monitor the impact of these changes on energy consumption.

These efforts are significant—changes to Braun’s Express’ long-haul trucks alone cost approximately \$10,000 per vehicle—and the results have been impressive. Last year, the company was recognized as an Energy Leader by the Massachusetts Department of Energy Resources.

Equally important, Braun’s Express is now teaching other transportation companies about sustainability. Because its onboard computers can actively track fuel economy and other factors, Normandin has collected vast amounts of data that will help other companies.

“We learned that these efforts, while costly up-front, offer an enormous return on investment, often paying for themselves in a single year,” says Normandin. “Because we can quantify this, we’re able to help motivate other transportation companies to make similar investments. This helps improve the sustainability of the entire transportation industry.”

“It’s important to do this,” adds Normandin. “It’s for our children’s children and this great planet of ours. If everybody works on it in their own little world, we can really make a difference.”

Dan Harris agrees. “After years of thinking about our environmental challenges,” he says, “I realize that the best way to make an impact is to take small steps close to home.”

For some, that means growing their own food. For others, it means driving less, conserving home energy or taking first steps to green their workplaces.

“Most of the time, these steps aren’t expensive, and they aren’t difficult,” says Harris. “They simply require getting started.”

Student Interns: *Learning Beyond the Classroom*


An important facet of an MCLA education is participation in high-impact experiences. These can include research projects, presentations at conferences and internships. Internships provide students with the ability to try out a career, learn more about a profession and most importantly, put their classroom skills to work.

Recent conversations with two students explored the role of the internship in a liberal arts education. Jammal Clark and Rachel Seklecki credit their internships with a broad range of benefits in both the classroom and the workforce.

Jammal Clark '09 was attracted to MCLA because of its intimate approach to liberal arts education and his desire to continue studying marketing, a subject he pursued in a technical high school. As a business major, Clark was all business when it came to stepping through the doors that MCLA helped open for him. During the 2008 winter break, Clark worked as a full-time intern with trustee Jim Clemmer '86, president of the medical supplies business segment at Covidien plc. Working in market research at Covidien, a global health care products company, gave Clark the chance to put his computer and analytical skills to work in the context of a new product launch. He also accompanied a veteran sales representative on calls to customers, giving him a greater appreciation for the breadth and depth of the health care field. "Getting out from behind a desk and talking with colleagues and customers helps keep people engaged," says Clark. He discovered that he enjoys a workplace that encourages him to take on different roles in different settings. "Being able to ask questions and give presentations gave me confidence," says Clark.

Clark's internship proved beneficial in the classroom as well. "I have experience in the corporate world, and that made me better able to participate in class," says Clark. He also credits his professional interactions at Covidien with making him more comfortable as a public speaker and as a leader. "You gain the best information by getting out and finding it for yourself," says Clark. "My internship allowed me to do that."

Rachel Seklecki '11 was able to combine her interests in writing, publicity and marketing with her passion for the arts as an arts management major. A grants and fundraising class with Professor Lauren O'Neal, coordinator of the arts management major, led to O'Neal's recommendation of Seklecki for a three-credit internship in the MCLA Office of Institutional Advancement. "We encourage our students to expand on their knowledge by seeing firsthand how different organizations do things differently," says O'Neal. Working with Director of Annual Giving Jocelyn Merrick, Rachel contributed to many Advancement Office programs including online communication, brochure design and special events planning. "Fundraising is so much more than

asking for money," says Seklecki. "It's a way to connect with people who share an interest in something you feel strongly about."

The next step for Seklecki will be to combine her interest in fundraising with her love of theater, and she will pursue both this summer through the Berkshire Hills Internship Program (B-HIP), which combines work experience with classes and interactive sessions with the area's leading arts professionals. She will be working on fundraising appeals and special events for the Williamstown Theatre Festival. "I am anxious to see how aspects of fundraising differ in an arts-related field," says Seklecki.

What Seklecki already knows is that her experiences and those of her MCLA classmates will become part of group discussions in future classes. "The classes are small, and we all have the chance to relate what we're learning in class to our own experiences," says Seklecki. Professor O'Neal agrees that student interns make connections between theory and practice. She points out that arts management students document what they do and are required to analyze their internship experiences through a journal, class presentations and a portfolio. "It is great for students to see the public impact of their work," says O'Neal.

Jammal Clark and Rachel Seklecki agree that their internships added to their classroom experience and provided an opportunity to learn more about their fields. Both students envision reaching back as alumni with their own offers to host interns.

MCLA alumni are encouraged to get involved in enriching the student experience by providing internships, participating on a career panel or volunteering as a guest speaker. This is an opportunity for you to interact with current students, to impact their decision-making and to gain insight into the future generation of employees. On Saturday, May 16, MCLA's Class of 2009 was awarded 357 degrees—including 42 master's degrees and 11 Certificates of Advanced Graduate Study. Author, musician and composer James McBride received an honorary Doctor of Fine Arts degree and delivered the keynote address.

Also receiving honorary degrees this year were local educator and the co-founder of Families of September 11, Sarah "Sally" Goodrich, who received an honorary Doctor of Humanities degree and Brian K. Fitzgerald '75, executive director of the Business-Higher Education Forum, who was awarded a Doctor of Public Service degree.

In addition, President Mary K. Grant awarded the President's Medal for Distinguished Service to MCLA's vice president of academic affairs, Dr. Steve Green, for his many years of service to the College and the community.

The newly redesigned Web site—www.mcla.edu—offers much more than eye-catching graphics and updated pictures of campus. Geared toward a new generation of Internet-savvy students, the Web site has been restructured to include a rotating selection of news stories about MCLA and its programs, faculty, students, alumni and staff.

“We’ve created a Web site that is cohesive and presents MCLA to the outside world in a better way, from a technological perspective,” says Mark Berman, who became the College’s first chief information officer in December 2008. “The Web site provides a content management system that is easy to use and allows the different departments to continuously update information. It looks good and lets us keep things current and vibrant.”

The new Web site will appeal to all sectors of the MCLA community, particularly to potential students who are accustomed to navigating the world via the Internet.

“Web sites have become the primary tool used by prospective students during their college search,” says Denise Richardello, vice president of enrollment and external relations. “Our Web site now serves a critical function. It needs to be one that is easily navigated with more than just facts and figures. It needs to have information students are looking for and be attractive at the same time.”

Prospective students not only access facts via the Web site, they use it to register for Open House programs, to apply for admission, and to communicate with college staff and faculty.

Amy Stevens, MCLA’s Web communications manager, says that the new Web site is more than just a new front page and splashy colors.

“Over the past five years, prospective student use of the Internet in choosing a college or university has risen from a mere 30 percent to a startling 98 to 100 percent,” Stevens says. “Students are forming their first impressions of a college based on our Web presence, making judgment calls about how easy it is to work with us based on how easily they find what they’re looking for. Our new Web site was designed to put these students, their parents and our alumni first.”

Berman says the redesigned Web site will benefit everyone connected with MCLA.

“This allows us to reach out to all sorts of people, from our offices on campus to prospective students, parents and alumni, to the Berkshire County community and beyond,” he says. In addition, MCLA’s new Facebook site takes advantage of a popular Web-based networking tool to broaden and enrich the College’s community.

Berman says the new Web site and Facebook page are just a few examples of improvements to technology services and Internet accessibility at MCLA.

The College recently doubled its bandwidth connection and is working on a plan that will better integrate the use of laptop computers with academic departments. Berman says he is also developing a shared computer-based calendar/scheduling program for the College and is investigating ways to make administrative desktop computing “more functional.”

“Technology is an important part of President Grant’s strategic plan,” he says. “My hiring is an expression of the College’s commitment to using technology to improve pedagogy and student life and expand the reach of the College.”

Berman adds that another initiative involves the expansion of distance learning for students located far from campus, and for non-traditional students, who require more flexible course scheduling.

THE PASSING OF A LEGEND:

Sue Getchell M.Ed. '63

Pioneer of Women's Sports at MCLA

MCLA lost a beloved friend and colleague with the death of Sue Getchell, a trailblazer in women's sports at the College, on February 25, 2009.

Getchell was born and raised in Melrose, Massachusetts, where she was a prominent high school athlete. In 2005, she was inducted into the Melrose High School Athletic Hall of Fame.

She received a bachelor of arts degree in education from Bridgewater State College and a Master of Education degree from North Adams State College in 1963. Getchell taught in the North Adams public schools before raising her children, and then in 1969 returned to the College, where she was an associate professor of physical education and a coach.

Getchell had a lifelong love of sports and physical activity. She was a pioneer in the area of women's sports and began teaching and coaching women's athletics at North Adams State College before Title IX became law, according to the *Melrose Free Press*. She spent 20 years coaching a variety of sports, including field hockey, softball, gymnastics, archery and soccer.

"She was an outstanding person who was very dedicated to women's athletics," says Joseph Zavattaro '61, M.Ed. '63, athletic director and men's baseball coach at the College until 1995. "She was here at the very beginning, and she started a lot of programs in women's athletics."

According to Zavattaro, Getchell was the second women's coach at the College and greatly expanded women's sports, launching a field hockey program, women's basketball, women's soccer, and men's and women's tennis. Getchell did not coach every sport, but Zavattaro says she was instrumental in launching new sports programs and locating coaches for the few areas where she had no experience. For a long time, Getchell was the only female coach at MCLA.

Dorothy Houston, MCLA's assistant athletic director, says Getchell's advocacy for women extended well beyond the playing fields.

"She was very passionate about her students and her student athletes," Houston said. "She was a fighter for women's rights, whether it was in athletics or in the academic world."

After retiring from coaching, Getchell continued to teach and served as the chairwoman of the physical education department at the College. During her last two years at the College, she was director of the Susan B.

Anthony Women's Center. In 1998, Getchell and her husband Walter Getchell, M.Ed. '63, retired to Mansfield, Maine.

"She wanted to make sure there was equality between the genders," Houston says. "She was very passionate about what she did in the classroom, as well as in sports, and she made it enjoyable for her students to learn."

Houston recalls that even after retirement, Getchell contacted her about National Girls and Women in Sports Day, an annual event across the country that recognizes the progress of girls and women in sports. Over the years, MCLA has offered a very successful program of clinics for girls and women in various sports to celebrate the day.

"She wanted to make sure everything went well with the event," Houston says. "She was very interested in making sure there were opportunities for girls."

In 1999, Getchell was inducted into the MCLA Athletic Hall of Fame. And, in 2008 the College's Sportswoman of the Year Award, given annually to an upper-class, female student-athlete who has demonstrated excellence in both academics and athletics, was renamed the Sue Getchell Award.

As an advocate of women's involvement in athletics, Sue laid the path for the College's student-athletes today—many of whom do not realize what a pioneer she was.

Trailblazers in Florida

MCLA's baseball and softball teams headed to Florida for spring break in March, competing against other college teams as part of their athletic season. The men took part in the Russ-Matt Central Florida tournament, and the women competed in the Rebel Spring Games tournament. Following the games on Sunday, March 15, President Mary K. Grant held a cookout for more than 90 MCLA Trailblazers, their parents and friends of the College.

President Grant hosted the event at the Tradewinds restaurant at Bahama Bay Resort in Davenport, Florida. The buffet dinner, also attended by Chief Advancement Officer Marianne Drake, followed Sunday's baseball and softball games, when the men beat Clarkson University 7-5, and the women split their games, losing to Endicott College 11-3, but beating Allegheny College 6-0.

"Our teams have a loyal following of family and friends, many of whom come to Florida to watch them play. I had promised the teams in the past that I would come watch them play. It was a wonderful gathering," said President Grant.


Dear Alumni,

- E. The Alumni Association continues to gather momentum with regional alumni events held in Hartford, Boston and the Plymouth, MA, area, and in the Berkshires. In addition, several classes held volunteer-organized reunions this year, including the class of 1987's November reunion in Newton, MA and a 1990s reunion in Boston in May.



INNOVATION AT MCLA

Sixth Graders Participate in Hands-On Science at MCLA



Watch out Spielberg, here Comes Cody Romano!

MCLA Freshman Cody Romano's film *Dawn* received an "Indie Soul Special Recognition Award" at the Boston International Film Festival in April.

Dawn, a seven-minute film built around three sonnets by Chilean poet Pablo Neruda, was one of 100 films selected for the festival from over 2,500 submissions. A friend who shared his interest in Chile introduced Romano to Neruda's poetry. "I immediately fell in love with his work," Romano said. "I wanted to create something that would allow people to visualize his work and think about it in new ways."

Romano enlisted the help of two friends to portray the main characters in his film, which was shot in and around Boston last summer. The budding filmmaker had help from Cambridge Community Television, where he worked last summer, and the Center for Digital Imaging Arts at Boston University.

"The film cost \$300 to make and we were filming on a \$3 million soundstage," Romano said. Romano used equipment borrowed from his mother, who is also a filmmaker.

Romano said he was "honored and surprised" to learn his film was accepted at the festival, which also included independent films starring Kate Beckinsale, Matt Dillon, Angela Bassett and Ethan Hawke.

Romano's debut at MCLA came last spring, when the Admissions Office received his application along with a five-minute video. "I was never a good student in high school, and I felt my grade point average didn't fully reflect who I am," he said. Back to the Classroom and Now Giving Back

Andrew H. Mick '09, president of New England Newspapers, Inc., knows what it's like to finally complete a long-held goal. At age 60, after 39 years away from the classroom, Mick returned to school to finish his bachelor's degree at Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts.

This spring, Mick donned gown and mortarboard and stepped up to receive his degree along with more than 300 other graduates.

After three years of taking classes and juggling personal and professional responsibilities, Mick completed his degree as a non-traditional student in interdisciplinary studies. The experience was so transformative that he decided to establish a scholarship fund to help other students who don't fit the mold to return to college and pursue degrees.

Mick learned that non-traditional students opt out of returning to school for a variety of reasons including family and job commitments, fear of failure, worries about being the odd person out in a classroom of young people, and lack of money.

"I thought if we could create a fund to give a little scholarship to at least get people started, that would help," Mick said. Mick and his wife donated the first \$1,000 to the scholarship and solicited donations from friends and business associates to help the fund grow. Mick hopes to raise \$25,000. To date over \$10,000 has been donated.

Non-traditional students who are returning to school can apply for a \$1,000 scholarship.

"It's just to get people out of the gate," Mick said.

Mick understands well what it means to drop out of school. In 1970, circumstances forced him to leave school and get a full-time job. Mick was fortunate in that he was able to continue moving ahead professionally without a bachelor's degree, rising to the position of president and publisher of a newspaper chain. Mick said that the path he took is not an option in today's business world, where a four-year college degree, at minimum, is mandatory for success in most white-collar occupations.

He thinks it's even more critical for non-traditional students to go back to school in today's trying economic times.

"An awful lot of people today are stuck in jobs that are going nowhere or they have been laid off," he said. "Adult workers must continue to keep their skills up to date and get back into institutions of higher learning to finish their degrees or to develop new skills."

Mick returned to college himself at the urging of MCLA President Mary K. Grant. Grant had asked Mick to serve as chairman of the executive committee for the Berkshire Compact for Higher Education, an initiative focused on higher education in Berkshire County. The goal of The Compact is to provide opportunities for every Berkshire resident to achieve a minimum of 16 years of education. When Mick confided that he had left school after earning an associate's degree, Grant invited him to complete his studies at MCLA.

"It felt great," Mick said. "For me, it was strictly an adventure in personal accomplishment, not something that would land me a better job or a pay increase. At the age of 60, I felt like I accomplished one of those things on my bucket list. I've been reasonably successful and this was just something I wanted to give back. I wanted to help break down some of those barriers that keep people from going back to school."
